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

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ABSTRACT

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Key words: Sexism, Mass media, Diachronic, markedness theory, Political Correctness, Feminist Linguistic Activism

Sexism in a language appears because of the influence of sexist culture or we may say extreme patriarchy in social system. The social system like this is tended to put women in disadvantaged position in all that matters. Sexist language also contains asymmetry representation or put men and women in unbalanced position and provides gender stereotypes. English is a real example for sexist language figure, because English contains asymmetry representation in its grammar and provides gender stereotypes. One thing that makes sexism in social life worse is mass media role. Therefore, language used in media is very potential to spread notion of correctness and attitude toward language use. For the impact, when gender stereotypes is included in mass media and it is used frequently, at the end, sexist community will be actually formed. This thesis studies sexist language use in mass media and its development along five decades within 1965-2005, thus the study must be diachronic. In this study, descriptive qualitative is used because this study tries to describe phenomena related to sociolinguistic. Diachronic analysis contains synchronic analysis in the certain times, and then each description in the certain times is concluded as single description (diachronic). The synchronic description is based on the researcher interpretation. Data taken from *New York Times* Article are selected based on markedness theory, semantic derogation, asymmetry and generic bias. The result of this study reveals that the development of sexist language use is more subtle in nature by the time, it is because the issue of political correctness always exists beside feminist linguistic activism who demands change in language.

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
